Social engineering fraud refers to all of the various schemes designed to manipulate people into performing actions (usually involving the transfer of money or property) or divulging confidential information (which allows a fraudster to transfer money or property). This presentation will discuss coverage issues relating to social engineering claims submitted under the Computer Fraud, Funds Transfer Fraud and social engineering fraud insuring agreements of the Commercial Crime Policy, including an examination of how emerging case law addresses these claims. The presenters will discuss how the “direct loss” requirement in each of these insuring agreements plays a part in determining coverage. The presenters will also discuss the impact of an employee’s failure to follow company policy with regard to technology and security and will also review limitations and exclusions to coverage. Finally, the presentation will examine recent developments in the insurance market, including new insuring agreements to address social engineering claims.

The claim investigation process usually requires claims professionals and the attorneys they retain to engage in communications with various people, including witnesses, the insured, and the insured’s former employees and representatives. This presentation will address some of the ethical issues that a claims professional and his or her retained counsel might face in communicating with these groups of individuals during the claim process and how to address such issues. The presenters will first review the most pertinent restrictions on the retained attorney’s communications with various individuals, and then will address what, if any, similar restrictions apply to the claims professional’s communications. The presentation will provide the claims professional and retained counsel with a framework of the ethical rules that pertain to their communications with individuals involved in the claims process and will identify ethical considerations that should be taken into account by the claims professional as he or she seeks to obtain the information necessary to resolve a claim.

Taking Depositions and Statements Under Oath in a Fidelity Bond Case

Examinations under oath and depositions can be valuable tools to the fidelity insurer and its counsel in handling claims and coverage lawsuits. It is important for the fidelity claims professional and counsel to understand the legal obligations of the insured and rights of the insurer with respect to examinations under oath and the impact of the insured's failure to fully cooperate. The deposition of the insured and other potential witnesses will often determine whether a coverage issue can be resolved through summary judgment and can assist the insurer in developing a thorough understanding of the insured's claims. This presentation will focus on examinations under oath and depositions, the rules and case law governing these information gathering tools, and strategies for both taking and utilizing examinations under oath and depositions to effectively evaluate coverage and properly address a fidelity insurer's obligations under its bonds and policies.

Knowledge of Prior Dishonesty – Does It Really Terminate Coverage?

A principal rule of fidelity coverage is that coverage for an employee's dishonesty terminates upon the insured employer's obtaining knowledge of that dishonesty. This principle has been under attack for many years by insureds seeking coverage for losses due to their employees' dishonesty and more recently by regulators and legislatures that are essentially requiring that employers hire persons despite their criminal records. The presentation will review the history of the automatic termination provision and the cases interpreting this provision. The presenters will also discuss the new "ban the box" regulations and other recent regulatory initiatives which seek to limit or eliminate the automatic termination provision, such as New York Insurance Regulation 209, and will discuss how insurers are addressing these issues.
